From our pastor:

John 12:1-8

Jesus has made his way toward Jerusalem in Luke's gospel. We switch to this passage from John 12 with Jesus at the home of his good friends Martha, Mary, and Lazarus in Bethany. They gather for a meal as many of us often do in our local churches.

Martha serves the meal. As usual, she knows what has to be done and she does it. Mary is quietly in the background until unexpectedly she anoints the feet of Jesus with a very expensive perfume, and she then wipes his feet with her hair.

Judas Iscariot criticizes Mary's action as a waste of what could have been given to the poor. John's Gospel immediately tells us that this is because he is a thief. Jesus quickly tells Judas that Mary has anointed him in preparation for burial and that it will ALWAYS be possible to serve the poor, but that Jesus will not always be there.

As a result, we rightly admire Mary's love and extravagant generosity, particularly since Jesus himself praises her.

Truthfully, we are often more like Martha or even Judas. We want to be sure that everything counts and nothing is wasted. Even within the church, we look for responsible budgets that make the best use of every penny. We want to be good stewards of what we have been given; however, Christian stewardship is founded on an overwhelming love that leads to what some people might consider waste.

While we are preparing to celebrate Easter and all the activities that go with it, millions of refugees live around the world in miserable conditions. Addiction and violent crime statistics continue to rise in our country. The list of hardship goes on an on, and includes pain, abuse, pestilence, greed, selfishness, prejudice, and destruction. How can we celebrate?

Like Mary, we celebrate because Jesus is with us. Mary expresses love and gratitude for what Jesus has done. As do we. And the poor are always with us—in many ways, we ARE the poor, and Jesus calls us to serve others with the very same expression of love.

Being led by the Spirit to reach out brings challenges but our church family is changing by leaps and bounds

Just a few years ago, our children's department was getting smaller. We had about three children of elementary age attending. Many of the active youth group graduated and there were only a few teenagers. One of our church members, a teacher, brought a couple of students from school as guests. Another staff person challenged us to reach out to some children who were slipping through some of the other systems. These students and children did not have family that attended this church. We picked them up and brought them. And they wanted the van to come and get them again. They wanted back. And they brought a few friends and siblings.

Since then more staffing and additional volunteers of all ages have provided much needed leadership, love and guidance. We had strategized in committees and struggled with plans to take care of our church and prepare for the future. Many talked about various programs to reach out, Change is difficult. We had great ideas. Some of these stayed as ideas but bit by bit some ideas started becoming action steps. Shifting the focus to outside of our own church walls, to the neighborhood, to community schools, we found challenges we couldn't handle on our own. But, with God, we are finding ways. We have gone from a few children and a few youth to over a hundred and then some. We have struggled with finances on how to feed "our children" now. But we are feeding them. They eat together on Wednesday nights and Sunday nights. Sometimes they eat with other church members after church on Sundays. Also, we are feeding them more than food. And they are providing spiritual food for our church family as well. Our church has found grant money to help us do this. And because of this ministry, 1stChurch is attracting some young families who are excited about seeing a church that reaches outside of itself to find purpose in community.
